Data Sources for Opioid Abuse, Overdose, and Suicide

Opioid overdose (OD) and suicide are among the leading causes of preventable death in the United States. Gathering data on these problems and assessing how they intersect are key steps in identifying opportunities to prevent them. This tool presents 13 key data sources that provide indicators for opioid use and suicide. For each data source, we present the following information:

- Available demographic variables
- Possible limitations of the dataset
